The exhibition stands from a many different rooms where you can meet with different situations for example there is a kitchen, a bathroom, a market, a forest and a situation in the traffic.

In my opinion if you visit this exhibition you will understand better the blind people and maybe you will help them.

During the exhibition you can realise that how lucky are you because you have eyesight and you can also understand that how terrible can be the life for a blind people. You can also imagine that how awful is that when you don't see the most beautiful things in the life for example your child or just simply the sunset.
